Take a Hike, Ride a Bike

A 4-mile bicycle trail begins in the Riverside Day-use Area, winds through meadows and along the river bank and ends at the park's Butteville General Store. A one-mile hiking trail loops off the bike trail between the Pioneer Mothers cabin and Oak Grove Day-use Area, passing the park's historic townsite.

Watch for Wildlife

Wildlife abounds in the park. More than 130 bird species have been identified. Western Bluebirds are among the most notable year-round residents. Watch for these rare songbirds and their nest boxes along the Champoeg Townsite hiking trail and the park's bicycle trail. Ask for a Champoeg bird checklist at the visitor center.

Yurts and Cabins

Enjoy the year-round comforts of a domed tent with structural support, a plywood floor, lockable wooden door, lights and heating, and beds with mattresses. A bunk bed sleeps three, and a fold-out couch sleeps two. A fire ring and picnic table are right outside. Parking is nearby.

Or, try a cozy cabin, each is furnished with beds and mattresses for five campers. All have heating, lighting, fire rings, a table and four chairs.

Champoeg's Long History

Prior to 1840, the Champoeg prairie was home to Kalapuya Indians, who used the area for hunting, fishing, and gathering camas bulbs. Fur trappers first visited Champooick, as the area was known by Indians, in 1811. The Willamette Post was established in 1813 to serve the trappers. Some decided to settle here.

The Seeds of Government: In 1841, "Wolf Meetings" were held to discuss predator problems. Eventually, the meetings turned to creation of a government. On May 2, 1843, settlers voted 52 to 50 to establish a provisional government.

Transportation Hub: In 1844, the provisional government moved to Oregon City. Champoeg's location on the river made it a regular stop for stagecoaches and steamboats. By the end of the 1850s, the town had grown to 60 buildings and a population of 200. In 1861, a flood washed away most of the wooden buildings, and the townsite was abandoned. Champoeg remained as an important transportation link until another disastrous flood led to its total abandonment in 1892.

Preserving the Past

Champoeg Visitor Center: Exhibits bring to life the ways of the Kalapuya Indians, fur trappers, explorers and settlers. Also includes museum store. Call 503-678-1251, ext. 221 for center hours and program information.

Pioneer Memorial Building Pavilion and Monument: The newly restored plaza area commemorates the 1843 vote.

Manson Barn and Farmstead: Erected in 1862, the barn is an original Champoeg building salvaged after the 1861 flood.

Newell House: Originally built in 1852, it was rebuilt by the Daughters of the American Revolution. Info: 503-678-5537.

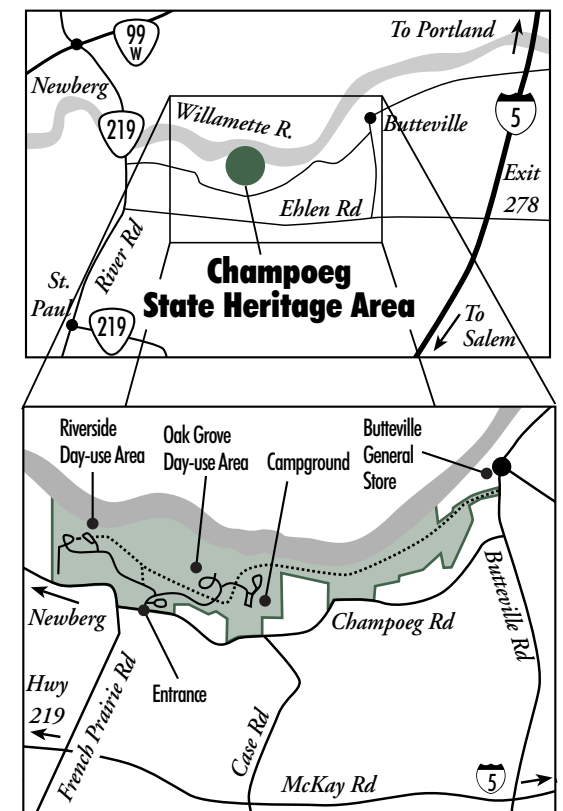
Pioneer Mothers Cabin: This hand-hewn log structure was established in 1931. Call 503-633-2237 for hours and fees.

Plan a Picnic

The park has two spacious day-use areas that offer reservable group picnic areas as well as individual sites. Both areas are open year-round from 7 a.m. to sunset. Riverside Day-use Area offers five group picnic areas with historic points of interest. Oak Grove has seven group areas along with a disc golf course and a boating/fishing dock.

Day-Use Fees

Day-use passes are required in the park all year. Display either a daily permit, a 12 or 24-month pass or your camping receipt on the driver's side of your dashboard. Your camping receipt is equal to a daily permit for those days registered. You may purchase a daily permit for \$3 at the entrance booth and visitor center. The 12-month (\$25) and 24-month (\$40) day-use passes are sold at G.I. Joe's stores in Oregon and at park offices.



- Campground quiet hours are between 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.
- Parking of vehicles and equipment is permitted only on paved areas.
- Bicycles are not permitted on hiking trails. Please ride with traffic flow on park roads. Helmets are required.
- Pets must be under control at all times (maximum six-foot leash) and wastes properly removed. Exercise area available.
- Check-in time 4 p.m.; check-out 1 p.m.

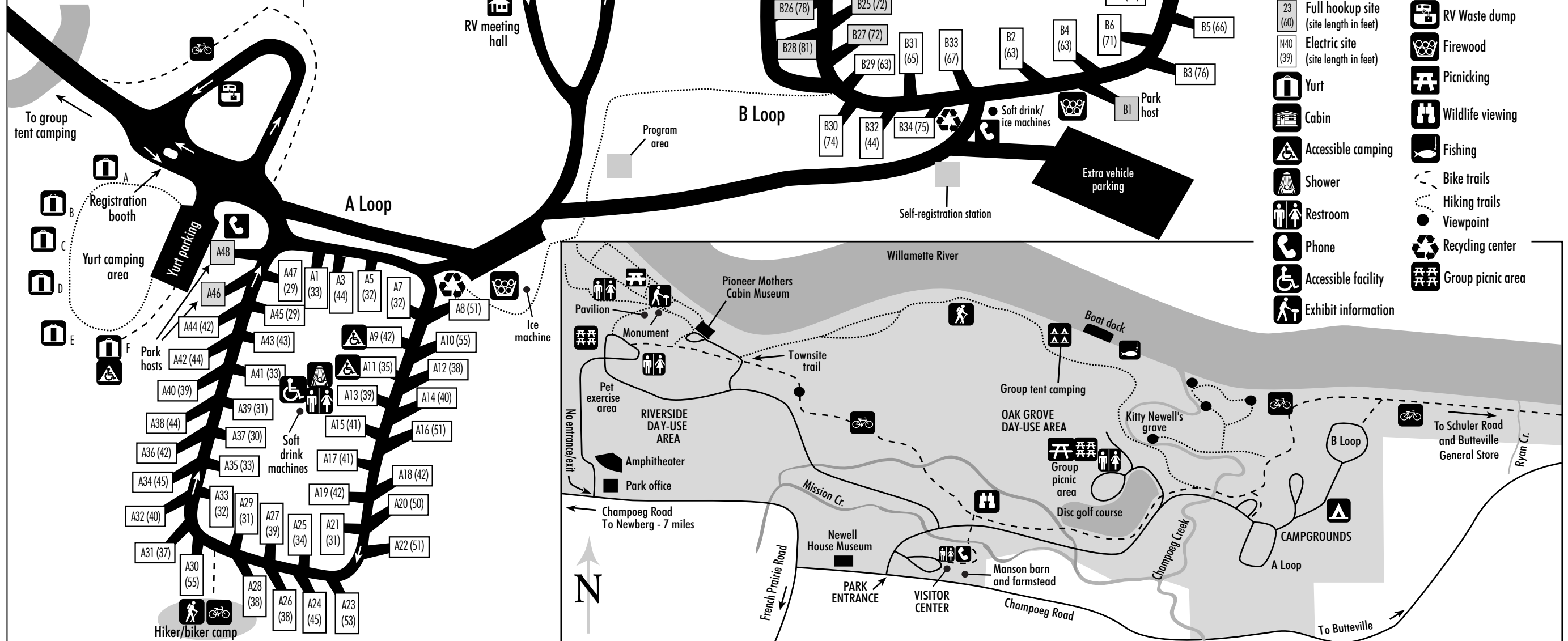
Reservation Seasons

A Loop: Closed Nov. 1-March 31.
 B Loop: 10 sites open on first-come, first-served basis from Oct.1-April 30.

Special Loop Rules:

Ropes, chains, nails, etc. are not to be attached to trees or shrubs.
 Gathering of dead material for firewood is prohibited.
