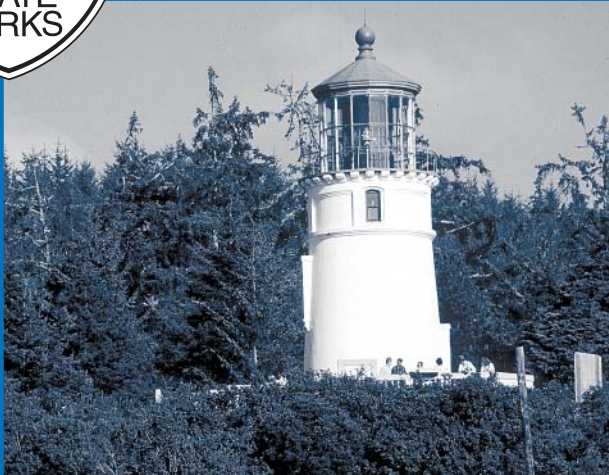

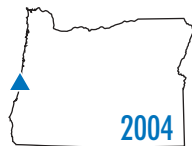

- 8 yurts (6 deluxe)
- 2 log cabins
- Paved parking, picnic table, fire rings at all sites
- Hot showers and flush toilets
- Hiker/biker camp

An RV dump station, is located at William Tugman State Park, 2 miles south on Highway 101.

Yurts and cabins

Enjoy the year-round comforts of a cabin or yurt. Cabins have beds with mattresses, heat, lights and seating. Basic yurts are circular, domed tents with structural support, and have wood floors, lockable wooden doors, lights and heating, and beds with mattresses. We also have six larger deluxe yurts, with kitchens, bathrooms and showers, refrigerators, microwave ovens and TV/VCR sets. The delux yurts sleep seven.

Discover the Difference

From October 1-April 30, camping in an Oregon state park is a whole new world of outdoor fun. It costs less, too. At Umpqua Lighthouse, your savings are \$4 for both full hookup and tent sites. Ask for a list of Discovery Season rates or call 1-800-551-6949.

Dunes North, Dunes South

Umpqua Lighthouse State Park is less than a mile from the famous Salmon Harbor on Winchester Bay. The campground and day-use areas are centered on Lake Marie, a beautiful freshwater lake perfect for boating and fishing.

The towering dunes of the Oregon Dunes National Recreation Area dominate the scenery. Hiking trails and areas set aside for off-road vehicles are nearby, as are dune buggy rentals.

Umpqua River Lighthouse

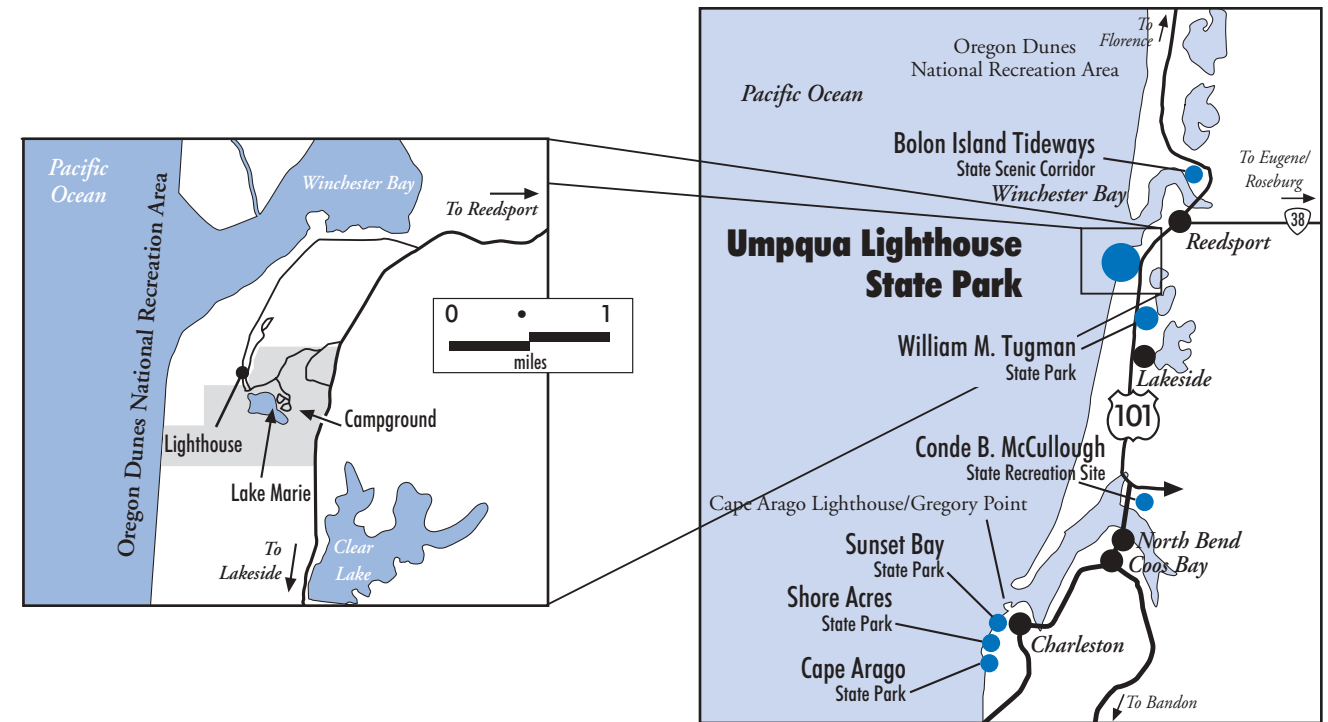
The first lighthouse on the Oregon coast was built on the north spit of the Umpqua River in 1857. However, it was destroyed in 1861 when it fell into the river after a severe storm. Today's Umpqua Lighthouse, with its 65-foot tower, overlooks dunes from 165 feet above the south side of Winchester Bay. Its lens emits distinctive red and white automated flashes. The lighthouse

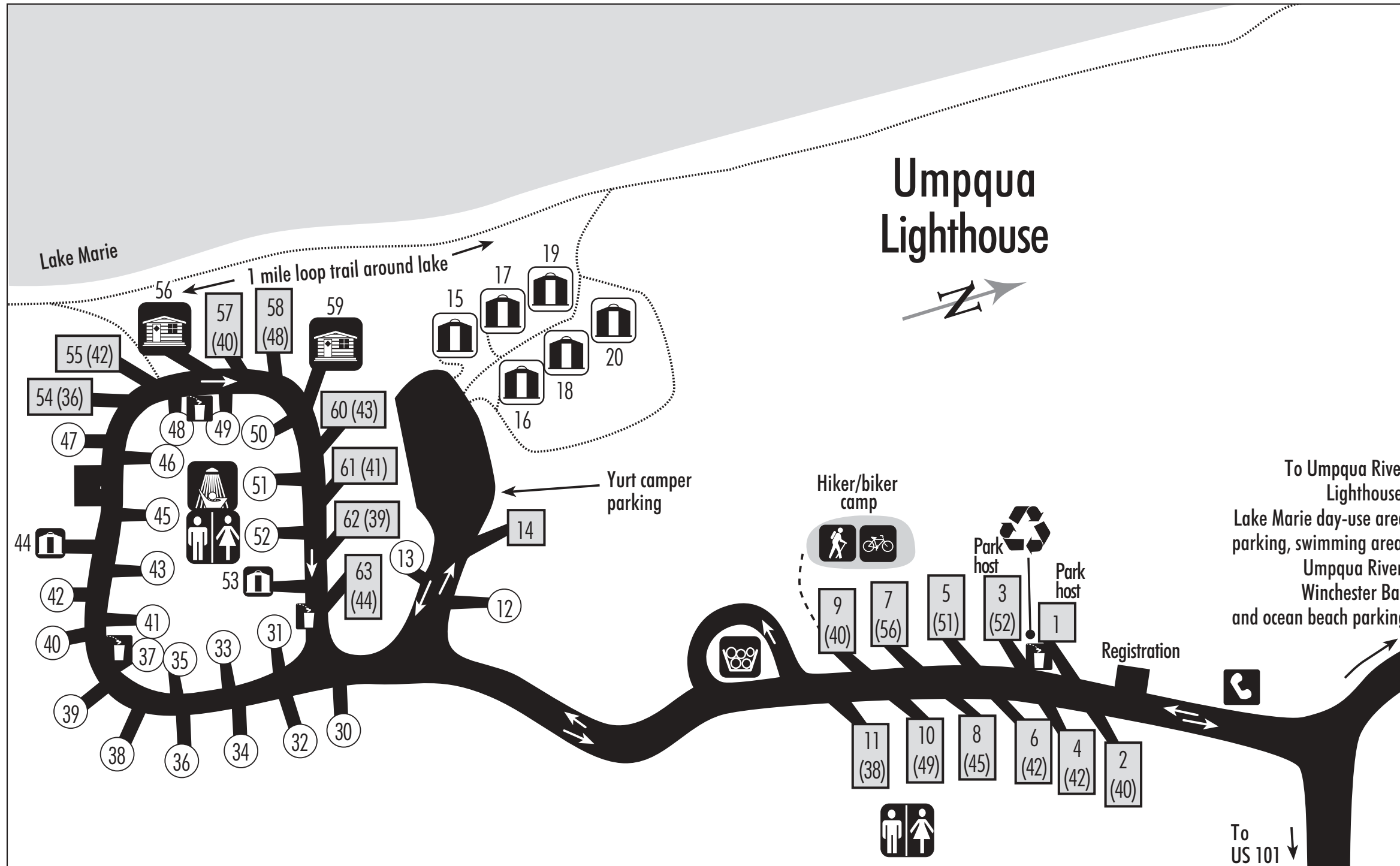
structure and museum are maintained by the Douglas County Parks and Recreation Department. Tours are offered May 1 through September 30. Call (541) 271-4631 for current schedules and information.

What's Nearby

William Tugman State Park is just a few miles south of Umpqua Lighthouse. The park features Eel Lake (a large, freshwater lake), large lawns, and a reservable gazebo-style picnic shelter. Eel Lake is a great place to boat, canoe, kayak, fish and watch wildlife.

Salmon Harbor on Winchester Bay, home of a large coastal fishing fleet, has charter fishing services, restaurants and shops. Lakeside, about a mile south of Tugman, offers resort facilities on the shore of Tenmile Lake.

- Campground quiet hours are between 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.
- Parking of vehicles and equipment is permitted only on paved areas.
- Bicycles are permitted on park roads, but not on trails. Please ride with traffic flow. Helmets are required.
- Pets must be under control at all times (maximum six-foot leash) and wastes properly removed.
- Check-in time 4 p.m.; check-out 1 p.m.
- **Play it safe on the beach! Stay off logs, know the tide schedule and don't turn your back on the ocean.**
