Yurts!

Enjoy the year-round comforts of a domed tent with structural support, a plywood floor, lockable wooden door, lights and heating, and beds with mattresses. A bunk bed sleeps three, and a fold-out couch sleeps two. A fire ring, and a picnic table are right outside. Reserve our yurts by calling Reservations Northwest (1-800-452-5687).

Discover the Difference

From October 1-April 30, camping in an Oregon state park is a whole new world of outdoor fun. It costs less, too. You can save \$4 per night on a full hookup or tent site. Ask for a list of Discovery Season rates or call 1-800-6949.

On the Beach

Look for sea anemones, starfish, eel, sea biscuits, jellyfish and, in the winter, agates. Vehicles are prohibited on the beach from the north Lane County line to a point south of Heceta Head.

Hike the Wild Side

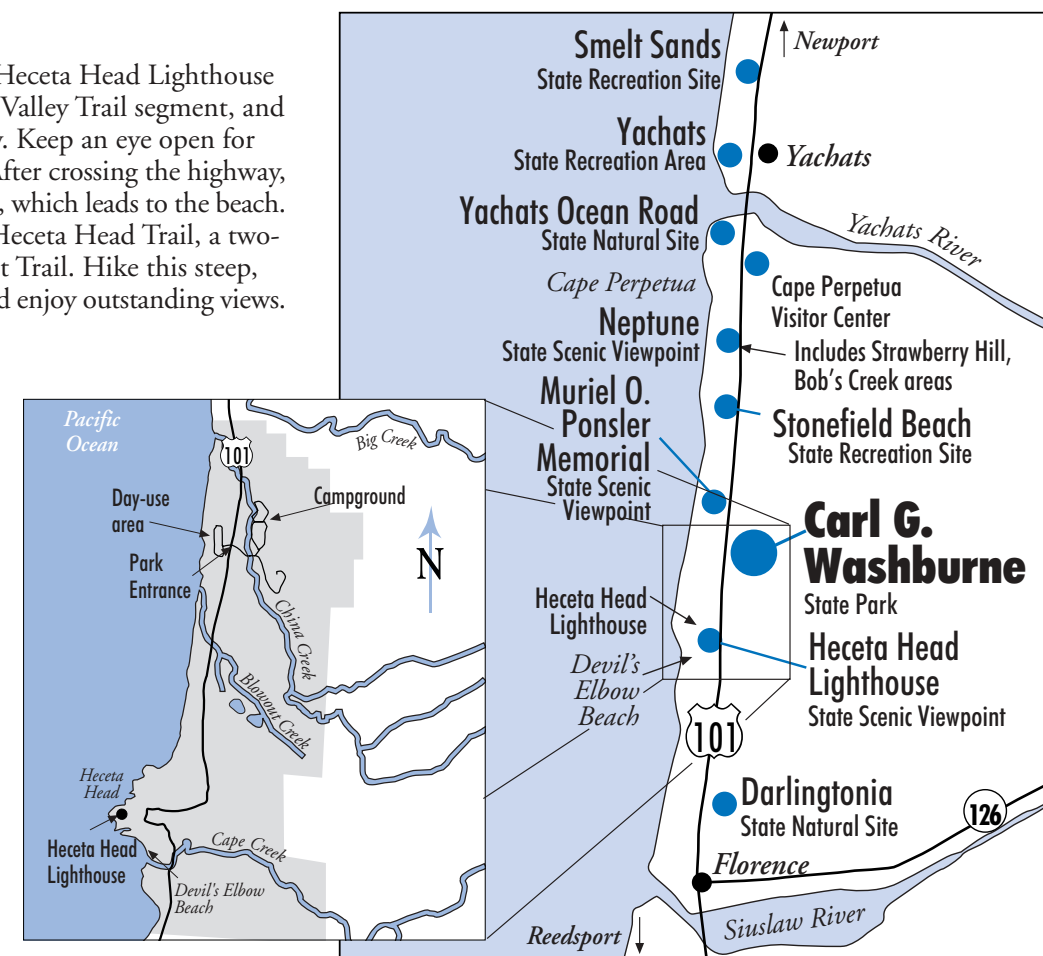
A seven-mile, round-trip hike to Heceta Head Lighthouse begins at the campground on the Valley Trail segment, and follows China Creek to a meadow. Keep an eye open for Roosevelt elk and other wildlife. After crossing the highway, you meet up with the Hobbit Trail, which leads to the beach. Watch for the junction with the Heceta Head Trail, a two-mile segment of the Oregon Coast Trail. Hike this steep, winding path to the lighthouse, and enjoy outstanding views.

Heceta Head Lighthouse

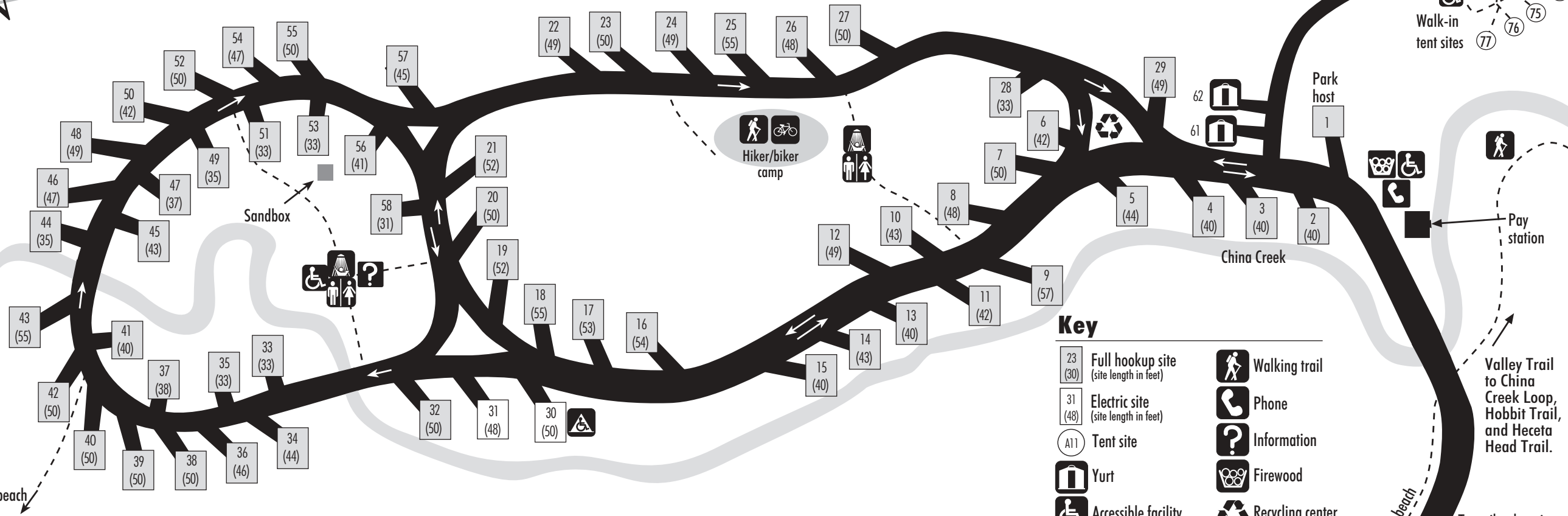
Perhaps the most photographed lighthouse on the Oregon coast, Heceta Head Lighthouse sits 205 feet above the Pacific. Its dramatic cliffside setting is the focal point of Heceta Head Lighthouse State Scenic Viewpoint, a day-use area with picnic sites adjacent to Devil's Elbow Beach. The original lighthouse was built in the early 1890s, and its light began shining in 1894. The light from the Fresnel-type lens was rated at 80,000 candle power and could be seen as far as 20 miles offshore. In 1963, the original light (and its keeper) were replaced by an automated beacon. The new light

still emits a beam more than 20 miles out to sea and is rated as the strongest light on the Oregon coast. Free tours from March-October; call 1-800-551-6949 or 541-997-3641 (Honeyman State Park). Special tours may be arranged by calling 541-547-3416.

The trail to the lighthouse passes another historical structure, a Queen Anne-style house, enclosed by a white picket fence, that was once home to the assistant lightkeepers. Now known as Heceta House, it is available for bed and breakfast rentals and for group events. Call 541-547-3696.



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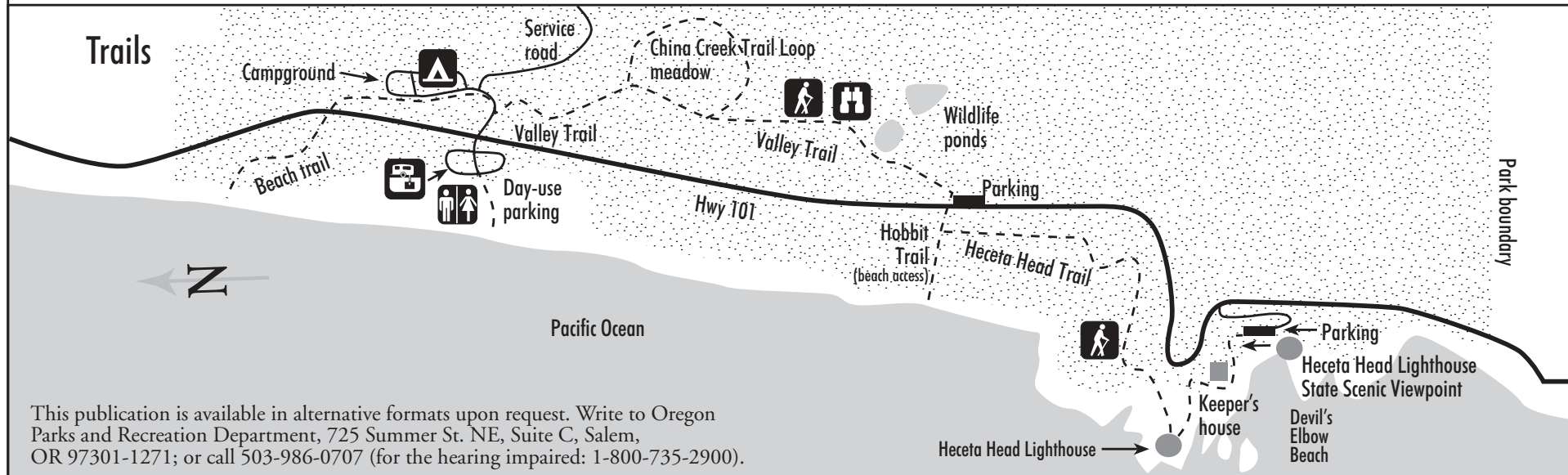
