CAMPGROUND



Bullards Beach State Park, located at the mouth of the Coquille River on Oregon's southern coast, offers visitors the chance to stroll on an ocean beach, ride horses, explore a lighthouse, and launch boats to go fishing on the river.

Year-round Camping

- 103 full-hookup sites (sewer, electricity, water)
- 82 electrical sites with water
- 13 yurts (A59, C29 and F are pet-friendly)
- Paved parking, picnic table, and fire ring at all sites
- Horse camp with eight primitive sites
- Hiker/biker camp
- Flush toilets and hot showers
- Yurt meeting hall
- RV dump station
- Day-use area with beach access, picnicking and historic lighthouse.
- Boat ramp on the Coquille River with courtesy docks for loading and unloading from mid-May through October.

Universal Access

Six campsites (A60, A63, B56, B58, C7, and C9) and three yurts (A38, A59, and A62) are accessible according to the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Yurts!

Enjoy the year-round comforts of a domed tent with structural support, a wood floor, a lockable wooden door, lights, heating, and beds with vinyl-covered mattresses. A bunk bed sleeps three, and a futon couch sleeps two. A fire ring, picnic table, and paved parking are right outside. Up to two pets (cats and/or dogs only) are allowed in the pet-friendly yurt for an additional fee.

Smoking in Oregon State Parks is allowed only in personal vehicles, RVs, campsites and portions of day use parks along state highways that are designated as safety rest areas by the Oregon Department of Transportation.

Horse Play

The park's horse camp near the beach has three double and five quadruple corrals. Enjoy four miles of ocean beach and 11 miles of designated trails for riding.

Trails for Hiking and Biking

The campground is just over a mile from the shore, and trails lead to the beach as well as to acres of dunes. Bring your bicycle for a fun ride on the hard-packed sand.

A Learning Environment

Junior Ranger activities designed for ages 6–12 years are a fun way for kids to learn about salmon, wildlife, bicycle safety, and river travel. Check registration booth for schedules.

Visitors of all ages can enjoy summer programs in the park's amphitheater.

Visit the Lighthouse

The historic Coquille River Lighthouse, built in 1896, stands at the end of the park's beach access road. Decommissioned in 1939, it no longer serves as a navigational aid. The "fog room" contains historical displays and a small gift shop; the proceeds support renovation efforts. The lighthouse is open for interpretive tours led by park volunteers from mid-May through the end of September. Call the park office at 541-347-2209 to get information about hours of operation or schedule large group tours.

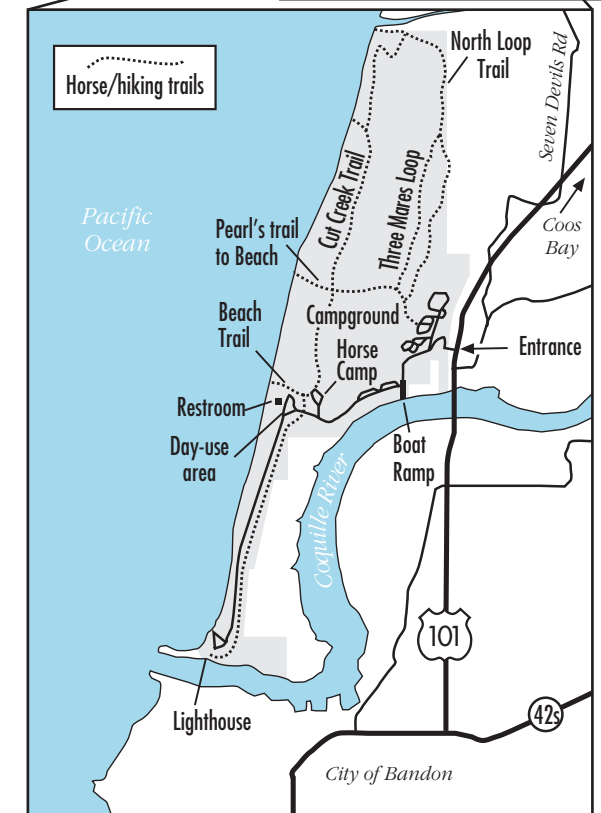
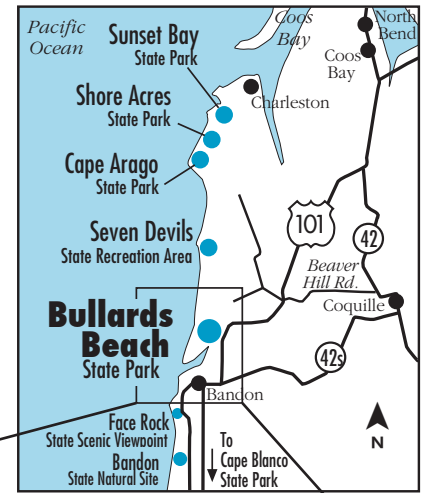
Bandon by the Sea: Visit the shops, galleries, and restaurants in Old Town Bandon, the center of a community called either "The Cranberry Capital of Oregon" or "The Storm-Watching Capital of the World," depending on the season. For more information about activities in Bandon, stop by the visitor information center in Old Town.

Nearby state parks: Across the river near Bandon, **Face Rock State Scenic Viewpoint** overlooks an impressive offshore monolith and a beach full of statuesque rock formations.

A trail leads to the beach, where rocky intertidal areas appear at low tide. A few miles farther south on Bandon's Beach Loop Road, **Bandon State Natural Area** offers more beach access and great views.


Western snowy plovers nest along some parts of the Oregon coast. Watch for special signs during nesting season.

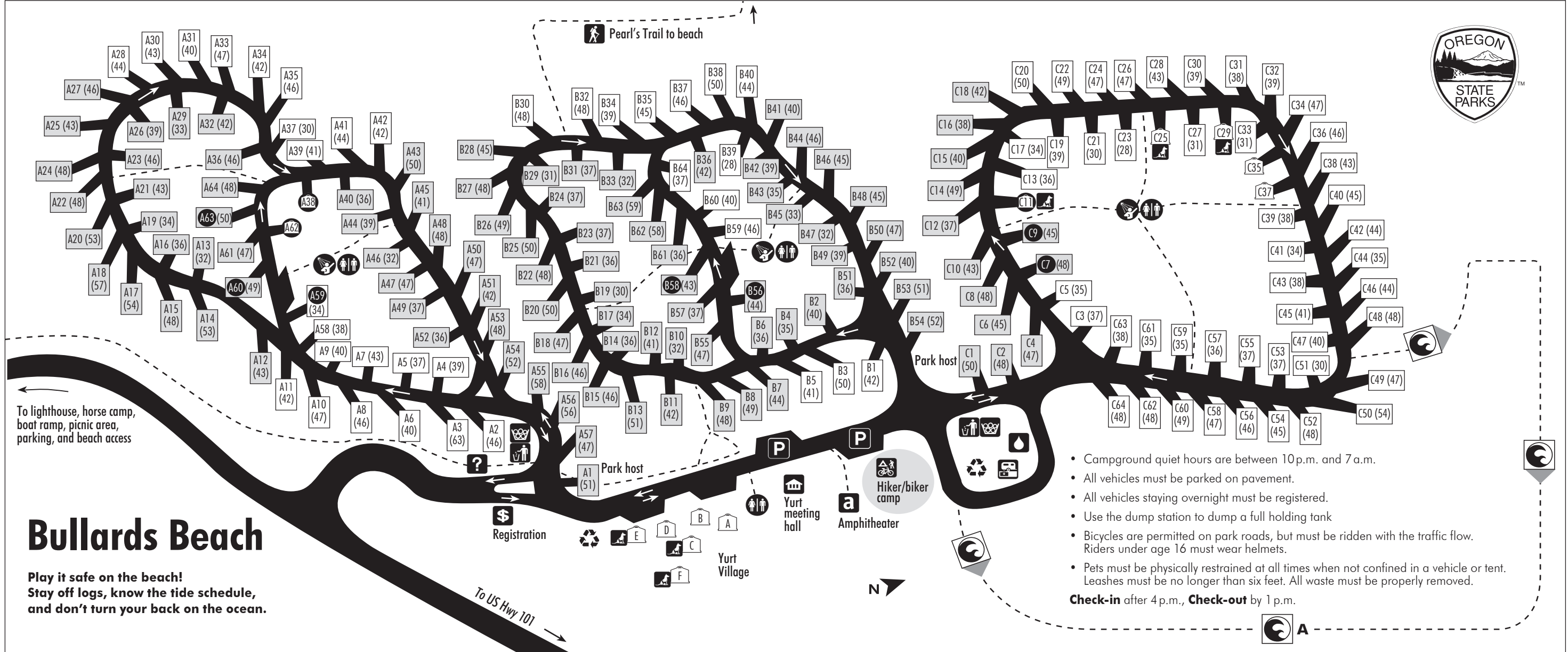

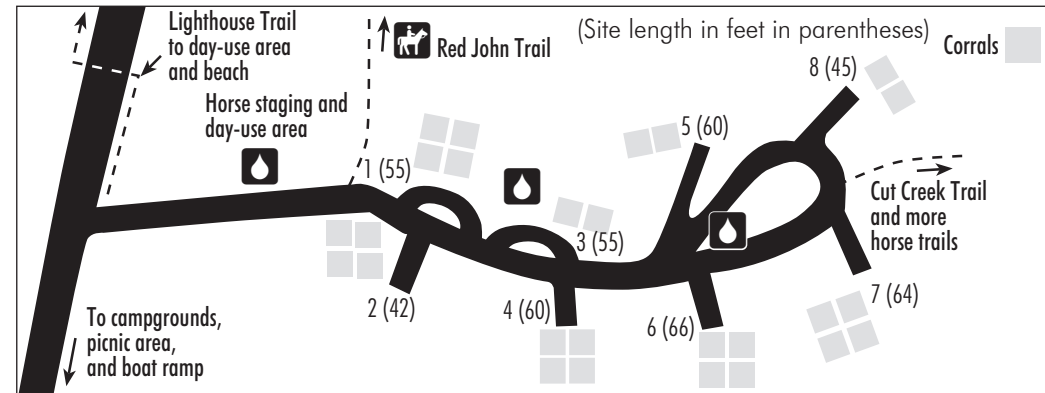
Bullards Beach

Play it safe on the beach!
Stay off logs, know the tide schedule,
and don't turn your back on the ocean.

- Campground quiet hours are between 10 p.m. and 7 a.m.
- All vehicles must be parked on pavement.
- All vehicles staying overnight must be registered.
- Use the dump station to dump a full holding tank
- Bicycles are permitted on park roads, but must be ridden with the traffic flow. Riders under age 16 must wear helmets.
- Pets must be physically restrained at all times when not confined in a vehicle or tent. Leashes must be no longer than six feet. All waste must be properly removed.

Check-in after 4 p.m., **Check-out** by 1 p.m.

Horse Camp

- Tethering horses outside of corrals is not permitted.
- Only one horse is allowed in each corral.
- Please keep corrals and stalls clean and free of straw and manure.
- Fires are permitted only in the fire rings provided.
- Ride on designated trails and along the beach only.
- Stay off paved trails and roadways.
- Please dispose properly of all waste.
- Only people with a horse or similar large animal may occupy a horse campsite.
